

teamwork, perseverance, and determination, we defeated them, securing the championship for the third consecutive year.


It was a proud moment for the seniors and me as we lifted the trophy together, ending our high school soccer careers on an unforgettable high note.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE: STRUCTURE AND DIRECTION By Cheryl Crawford

This summer and fall, the JRHS Faculty has been getting training in Artificial Intelligence from The Social Institute. After attending a day long seminar, JRHS hosted a groundbreaking Artificial Intelligence Student Seminar to educate students about AI and its impact on their academic and personal lives. The workshop was designed to provide foundational knowledge, hands-on demonstrations, and guidance on ethical and responsible use of AI.

The seminar began by breaking down AI into accessible terms. Students learned that AI uses machine learning to analyze data and make predictions. Generative AI, like tools used for creating text or images, was highlighted as a new way to inspire creativity and problem-solving. By comparing AI to traditional online searches, students gained a deeper understanding of how AI creates original responses rather than simply retrieving information.

Students saw firsthand how AI generates responses, but they also explored its limitations, including its potential to produce false information. Through live examples, they were encouraged to approach AI with curiosity and critical thinking, and perhaps most importantly, through their growing biblical worldview.

The seminar emphasized how AI can support learning: Strengthening writing skills by generating ideas. Summarizing complex texts for better comprehension. Creating practice problems and thought-provoking questions. Students were also warned against using AI to shortcut their learning, such as relying on it to complete assignments without personal effort.



Al is shaping the future, and JRHS is equipping students to use it wisely. By integrating Al responsibly into their learning, students can enhance their creativity, critical thinking, and preparedness for a technology-driven world. JRHS is proud to guide students in navigating these innovations with integrity and purpose.

YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS PROGRAM

JRHS, a school that is inherently entrepreneurial, has formally launched the Entrepreneurial Education Program. Taking our training from The Seed Tree Group out of Cincinnati, the faculty launched this inaugural program in September. Ten students, led by 4 Seniors, have been studying "The Entrepreneurial Mindset" this semester: having a growth mindset, being resilient, seeking opportunities, and learning from failure. Additionally, the students have designed a class venture and are working on elements of vision, marketing, and overall structure of a student-led community building social media "journal" to



broaden and inform our community in more ways that are relevant to students their age.

JRHS GIVING - A CULTURE OF GENEROSITY

As JRHS turns the corner into 2025, we can look back and see God's abundant provision through His faithful and generous people. JRHS is incredibly grateful for the Financial Partners that bring life into the program through generous giving to our mission. Here are some highlights of the 2023-2024 giving year, all told, bringing nearly \$275,000 into the ministry:

Annual Fund contributions approached \$90,000 over this time, which is money that directly supports the program in critical areas like faculty compensation and program delivery.

JRHS is blessed to have Partners who give to JRHS regularly, we call our Sentinel Society. This group contributed \$65,000 into the life of the school.

The endowed Financial Aid Fund assists families that need tuition assistance, and we received \$11,000 into that fund over the year.

Several Partners prioritize Campus Development with their giving allowing us to invest \$35,000 into improving and maintaining our unique campus.


The students earned just over \$10,000 for the Student Enrichment Fund, and other Partners supported the Spring Mission Trips for another \$22,000.
